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BAIL SUPERVISION

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>Bail Supervision is available across the whole of Aberdeenshire for all ages and genders.</p>
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Bail supervision</p>
<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>Bail Supervision operates within the provisions of the Criminal Procedure (Scotland) Act 1995 and is designed to reduce the numbers of accused persons held on remand in custody pending trial or for reports after conviction, who subject to safeguards in respect of public safety could be released on supervised bail pending their further court hearing. In Aberdeenshire, Bail Supervision is provided by the Aberdeenshire Council Criminal Justice Social Work Service. Individuals who would otherwise be held on remand are released on bail on the condition that they meet with an identified bail supervisor from the Aberdeenshire Criminal Justice Social Work Service a specified number of times per week – the aim of these meetings being to support the individual to comply with the conditions of their bail, as well as monitor and manage their risk of reoffending within the community.</p>
<p>Possible Outcomes</p>	<p>Bail Supervision is intended to provide a robust and credible alternative to remand where individuals are assessed as requiring a level of supervision and support to meet their bail conditions. In terms of Community Justice Outcomes, Bail Supervision could contribute towards:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Effective Interventions are delivered to prevent and reduce the risk of further offending. • People have better access to the services they require • Life chances are improved through needs being met. • Individuals resilience and capacity for change and self-management are enhanced.
<p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p>	<p>Bail Supervision is available for people from the Aberdeenshire area who are appearing at Aberdeen, Banff or Peterhead Sheriff Courts who, due to their underlying complex needs, may be unable to comply with regular bail conditions or community sentences and as a result, are at risk of remand and/or custody. Bail Supervision will therefore be targeted at those whose application for bail would likely otherwise have been unsuccessful. Criminal Justice Social Work will be responsible for liaising with the Procurator Fiscal and checking for risk of remand and clarify offence details to ensure that the case is suitable for Bail Supervision. Before Bail Supervision is granted, an assessment of suitability is completed and a written report will be provided to the Court from Criminal Justice Social Work using the</p>

	<p>pro-formas based on the National Guidance document. The assessment for Bail Supervision will take account of a number of factors, including: Nature of the charges and any outstanding charges, including breaches of bail; Public / Witness Protection; previous failure to appear / absconding; suitability of accommodation; areas in the individual's life where they may require support during the bail period; and willingness to agree to the conditions of bail and supervised bail. Bail Supervision would not be considered suitable for persons who are not at risk of remand.</p>
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COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: UNPAID WORK

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>Unpaid Work (UPW) is available across the whole of Aberdeenshire for all ages and genders.</p>
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Unpaid work</p>
<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>Unpaid Work (UPW) is available across the whole of Aberdeenshire for all ages and genders. The UPW Service has Task Supervisors at bases in Banff, Fraserburgh, Inverurie, Peterhead and Stonehaven, with vans available to collect and drop off those individuals who cannot reach the workshop, project or community space by other means. At the current time, work is being carried out on a 1:1 or 2:1 basis and vans are only being used to transport a maximum of one service user and one supervisor at a time.</p> <p>UPW projects are available throughout Aberdeenshire, the work provided is wide and varied and is adapted to individual ability and skill level, and COVID considerations. Ordinarily, both outdoor and indoor projects are available, with workshops utilised when the weather makes outdoor work unsuitable. At present, outdoor projects are preferable.</p> <p>A higher level of support is also available through a smaller programme team for those individuals who are identified as being likely to benefit from an increased level of support in order to engage with the service.</p> <p>A range of physical, educational, employability and recreational activities have also been identified which can be classed as Any Other Activity and count towards the overall number of unpaid work hours imposed. In recent months, this has included the Street Cones online workshops, described below.</p>

If considering imposing a Community Payback Order with an Unpaid Work Requirement, the Sheriff may wish to refer to the assessment of potential suitability for Unpaid Work, which will be included within the Sentencing Options Section of the Criminal Justice Social Work Court Report. Such a requirement would only ever be suggested where the individual is in agreement.</p>

Interventions suitable for	Supervision is available across the whole of Aberdeenshire for all ages and genders.
Programme Title and Provider	Supervision
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Aberdeenshire Criminal Justice Social Work will provide Supervision to persons of all ages and genders. This includes young people, women (Aberdeenshire Women's Service), men who present a high risk of reoffending (Intensive Interventions Service), and individuals with additional support needs (Higher Support Needs Team) - with a view to helping them to manage their community order and reduce risk of reoffending. These supports and services are available through referral to the Aberdeenshire Criminal Justice Social Work Service (e.g. as part of a Community-based Order).
Possible Outcomes	<p>As per National Outcomes and Standards for Criminal Justice Social Work - https://www2.gov.scot/resource/doc/925/0103556.pdf:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Supervision is available across the whole of Aberdeenshire for all ages and genders. If considering imposing a Community Payback Order with a Supervision Requirement, the Sheriff may wish to refer to the assessment of potential suitability for Community Disposals, which will be included within the Sentencing Options Section of the Criminal Justice Social Work Court Report. Such a requirement would only ever be suggested where the individual is in agreement. That said, a level of motivation and supporting compliance is a component of the approach required.

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: PROGRAMME

An offender Supervision Requirement will always be imposed where a programme requirement is made by the court. The duration of the programme must not exceed the period of the offender Supervision Requirement. Section 227P(2) of the 1995 Act defines a programme as: 'a course or other planned set of activities, taking place over a period of time, and provided to individuals or groups of individuals for the purpose of addressing offending behavioural needs'. This includes accredited and non-accredited programmes.

In Aberdeenshire, the following 3 programmes are available:

Programme Title and Provider	Caledonian Group Work Programme / Caledonian Individual Programme
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>The Caledonian Programme is the national accredited programme for men convicted of domestic offences. The preferred method of delivery for the Caledonian Programme is through group work, however, Caledonian is also accredited to be delivered on a 1-1 basis should responsibility issues prevent the man from engaging in the group work process. The Caledonian system offers support to both women and children who've been victims of abuse and support to any current partners the man be involved with.</p> <p>At the current time, due to the ongoing situation with COVID-19, although group work has now recommenced, this is on a smaller group basis than before. The men's programme has continued to be delivered through a combination of 1-1 and 2-1 where required, utilising the newly accredited individual programme. Plans are in place for a return to group work in September 2021.</p>

Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>Moving Forward: Making Changes (MFMC) is the National programme for sexual offenders, however, this programme is not accredited and is currently being revised by the Scottish Government. MFMC can be delivered in either a group format or a 2-1 basis. Guidance from the Scottish Government suggests the MFMC programme should continue to be delivered to accreditation standards to ensure the integrity and governance of the programme.</p> <p>As of May 2021, MFMC groups have restarted, with participants offered two sessions where possible and once per week in more rural areas of Aberdeenshire.</p>

Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Specific to Aberdeenshire Council, the Aberdeenshire Sex Offender Programme is a non-accredited programme delivered to men convicted of sexual offences where MFMC may not be assessed as suitable. Typically this programme is aimed at men who score low or low / moderate on risk assessments and the high level of intensity that MFMC offers is not required to address the minimal treatment needs identified. This programme is delivered on a 1-1 basis with formulation of treatment needs assessed by the programmes team in Aberdeenshire.

Each individual will have a bespoke service tailored to meet individual need.</p>

DRUG TREATMENT AND TESTING ORDER (DTTO)

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>Individuals where there is evidence that there is a pattern of offending that relates to drug misuse.</p>
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO)</p>
<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>Aberdeenshire Criminal Justice Social Work will provide Drug Treatment and Testing Orders to persons of all ages and genders who meet the criteria set out in Guidance provided by the Scottish Government, that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The person is dependent on or has propensity to misuse drugs; and - The dependency or propensity requires and may be susceptible to treatment; and - The person is suitable to be subject to an order.
<p>Possible Outcomes</p>	<p>The emphasis of a DTTO is on drugs treatment as the primary means of reducing offending behaviour. Specifically, the objectives of a DTTO are to: 1) Reduce or eliminate an individual's dependence or propensity to misuse drugs; and 2) Achieve positive changes in the scale and frequency of drug related offending. (Scottish Government DTTO Guidance - https://www2.gov.scot/Publications/2011/07/04143958/24)</p> <p>In terms of Community Justice Outcomes, a Drug Treatment and Testing Order could contribute towards:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Effective Interventions are delivered to prevent and reduce the risk of further offending • People have better access to the services they require, including welfare, health and wellbeing, housing and employability. • Life chances are improved through needs, including health, financial inclusion, housing and safety, being addressed. • Individuals' resilience and capacity for change and self-management are enhanced.
<p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p>	<p>The Court can request an assessment of suitability for a Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO) where there is evidence that there is a pattern of offending that relates to drug misuse. Criminal Justice Social Work will undertake the assessment of suitability and then return a full assessment report after a period of 4-6 weeks to the Court for their consideration.</p>

	<p>Criminal Justice Social Work can also consider a DTTO assessment if a Criminal Justice Social Work Report is requested. CJSW would ask the Court to then defer for a further period (6-8 weeks) for the whole assessment.</p> <p>Evidence of motivation, willingness to engage, readiness and compliance with Criminal Justice and Social Work and Substance Misuse Services (SMS) are the key components of suitability.</p>
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STRUCTURED DEFERRED SENTENCE

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>Structured Deferred Sentences are intended for individuals presenting with underlying problems or chaotic lifestyles that result in offending behaviour or with a higher level of risk/need, and who require or would benefit from Social Work support. This could include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Individuals aged 16 – 26 years (but not exclusively) • Individuals with a limited offending history or first-time offences • Individuals with limited recent offending • Individuals at risk from custody, and where risk can be safely managed in the community (for example, this could be individuals with a recent history of non-compliance, persistent low-level offending, first offence which is of a serious nature, etc.) • Individuals identified as having complex needs, such as basic welfare needs (food, accommodation), financial difficulties, employability, history of trauma/abuse, substance misuse, physical/mental health, isolation, relationships difficulties or negative associations, etc. <p>Individuals already subject to a community-based disposal(s) could also be considered for a Structured Deferred Sentence.</p>
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Structured Deferred Sentence</p>
<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>Local Authorities are now directly funded by the Scottish Government to deliver Structured Deferred Sentences as a disposal from Court.</p> <p>In Aberdeenshire, Structured Deferred Sentences are delivered by the Aberdeenshire Council Criminal Justice Social Work Service. Structured Deferred Sentences offer a credible and effective alternative to a Community Payback Order or a short period of imprisonment. A Structured Deferred Sentence can be imposed at the point of conviction but prior to sentencing, and allows for early intervention via a short period of structured support and focused work (normally between 3 to 6 months) delivered by Justice Social Work and/or multi-agency partners. The aim of this work is to address immediate and underlying welfare and criminogenic needs and to build motivation and capacity for change.</p> <p>This intervention should divert individuals from the Criminal Justice System and in turn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Avoid premature or unnecessary intensive periods of supervision in the community or short-term custodial sentences • Reduce the frequency or seriousness of offending behaviour • Reduce stigmatisation

	<p>Structured Deferred Sentences aim to reduce the “revolving door” effect of the Criminal Justice System by providing a starting point to address the individuals’ underlying needs and achieve stability in their lives through early and effective engagement with Services. The duty is intended to complement the preventative approach developed in recent years through the Housing Options Hubs across Scotland rather than to shift focus and resources from prevention to dealing with the crisis of homelessness.</p> <p>The regulations were established after public consultation and the services prescribed are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Advising or assisting a person with personal budgeting, debt counselling or in dealing with welfare benefit claims - Assisting a person to engage with individuals, professionals, or other bodies with an interest in the person’s welfare. - Advising or assisting a person in understanding and managing their tenancy rights and responsibilities, including assisting the person in disputes about those rights and responsibilities and - Advising and assisting a person in settling into a new tenancy. <p>Where an assessment determines the need for housing support, the local authorities must ensure the appropriate housing support services are provided. In addition, a housing support assessment must also be made for other people who reside with the applicant as part of their household and a separate package of support delivered if required.</p> <p>The legislation states that housing support services include any services which provides support, assistance, advice, or counselling to an individual with particular needs with a view to enabling that individual to occupy, or continue to occupy residential accommodation as the individual’s sole or main residence. The form</p>

	<p>and duration of support will vary depending on the individual's circumstances and/or those of the people in the household.</p>
