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BAIL SUPERVISION

Interventions suitable for	Those on bail.
Programme Title and Provider	Bail supervision
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Dundee CJS and Tayside Council on Alcohol (TCA) work together to offer Bail Mentoring. There are 36 available Mentoring spaces, although this is split between mentoring on bail and mentoring as part of a CPO. From September 2021 an extra bail mentor has been recruited using “justice recovery” funding. This increased capacity has been sustained for 22/23 and further funding has been allocated to TCA for a further 0.5 bail mentor in anticipation of further bail supervision in conjunction with Electronic Monitoring (EM) on bail. Dundee CJS is working up a scheme to enhance assessment for bail supervision including the possibility of EM on bail. A description of the scheme will be emailed to Sheriffs once the details are agreed.
Possible Outcomes	TCA have many years’ experience of providing mentoring. The scheme links the individual with a mentor who helps them prioritise the appointments and choices that will help them succeed on their bail. TCA provide an annual report on outcomes
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	A weekly update of availability of Bail mentoring spaces is communicated to the Court Social Worker. Due to the immediacy of Court processes there is no specific assessment template, Dundee CJS will seek to implement all Bail supervisions, as requested by Sheriffs, where a space is confirmed as available.

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: UNPAID WORK

Interventions suitable for	Those sentenced to Community Payback orders with Unpaid Work Requirement.
Programme Title and Provider	Unpaid work
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	2021 update: Unpaid work was significantly impacted by covid with two periods of national suspension. Unpaid work resumed in a group setting in April 2021 but with reduced staff to client ratios to maintain social distancing. Other activity has increased in use but cannot be more than 30% of an Order. It is anticipated that changes to the Public Health guidance in August 2021 will allow an increase in the staff to client ratio. A local update will be sent to Dundee Sheriff court when this is confirmed.
Possible Outcomes	Indoor workshop and external placements and also a range of individual placements for those who find group working more difficult. 100% satisfaction report from recipients of UPW and 78% satisfaction reported by those who were subject to it.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Suitability for UPW is assessed at the CJSWR stage

Dundee staff worked to a risk and need assessed prioritisation scheme which determined the level of face to face contact expected alongside telephone contact. The Community Justice office at Friarfield remained open throughout the covid period, with public health safety measures allowing individual appointments to continue.

Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	National programme delivered in Dundee according to agreed programme standards. Primarily a group work programme but can be delivered on an individual basis. 2021 update. MFMC continued to be delivered throughout the covid period. There were periods when public health guidelines led to groupwork being suspended but individual and 2:1 delivery continued. Increased use of telephone and video contact has been used alongside a prioritized frequency of face to face contact. Groupwork re-started in 2020 after the initial lockdown and again in 2021 after the second lock down at a reduced staff to client ratio to maintain social distancing. Groupwork restarted in 2022 and ratios will increase as Public Health guidance permits. Due to the adjustments made it is not anticipated that any individual sentenced to complete MFMC will need extra time due to public health measures.
Possible Outcomes	Programme work with convicted RSOs.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Joint assessment by Tay project and CJS. MFMC is not recommended for those assessed to be low risk. Depending on assessment of risk MFMC can be suitable for both those who have committed contact offences and those who have viewed internet material.

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Programme Title and Provider	Caledonian and Respect
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Caledonian is a National accredited programme., as such Caledonian is delivered according to a set formula which includes preparation for group and group work. Respect is derived from Caledonian but is not linked to a national oversight body, as such it can be delivered with some greater flexibility and may be offered for those assessed as unsuitable for Caledonian. 2021 update. Both Caledonian and Respect programme work has continued throughout the covid period. There were times when groupwork was suspended but individual work continued, using a prioritized mixture of face to face and telephone contact. Groupwork restarted in 2020 after the initial lockdown and again in 2021 after the second lock down at a reduced ratio of staff to clients. Support to female partners and ex-partners and children continued as well. Groupwork restarted in 2022 and ratios may well increase within group once we have Public Health agreement to do so.
Possible Outcomes	Programme work regarding Domestic abuse. Caledonian is primarily delivered through group work and Respect is individual work
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Joint assessment by Caledonian staff and CJS. Assessment of Domestic Abuse offences normally involves completion of SARA (Spousal Abuse Risk assessment) which considers evidence of patterns of behavior, including reference to non-convicted behavior. Within Caledonian assessments victim information, including direct contact with the victim, where consent is given, is sought.

Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Dundee began offering SDS as a possible disposal in May 2021. Community Justice staff will identify areas that may be helpfully addressed during the CJSWR writing stage, working alongside the individual to do so. Community Justice staff will implement the SDS but they may use the period to support the individual to attend appointments assessed as necessary. Referral may also be made to the health staff employed by Dundee CJS.
Possible Outcomes	The scheme is divided into two broad groups. Lower tariff cases where a period of structured support during deferment may be sufficient, with admonishment following successful completion and higher tariff cases where compliance with previous Orders has been problematic. In these cases the SDS may be viewed as a testing period prior to a CPO.

Programme Title and Provider	Transform Community Development
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>Brewery Lane: A 22-bed Intensive resettlement service for individuals who have faced homelessness and have previously struggled to sustain a tenancy. The service aims to prepare residents for their tenancy. Support staff are available 24 hours and offer a structured and stable environment. In which residents are given support to address the issues that contributed to their homelessness. Residents are required to take part in a planned programme of support based on their individual needs and ambitions. Brewery Lane's residents' independence is encouraged to promote future reintegration within the wider community and society as a whole. There is an emphasis on partnership working to ensure that residents are supported in their move to independent tenancies.</p> <p>Seagate: A 15 bedded supported accommodation unit which provides housing to those with complex mental health. The unit is staffed 24 hours and Residents have tenure for up to 5 years. The Project aims to help clients develop the skills needed for independent living or less supported accommodation. Residents are encouraged to live their lives as independently as possible and are prompted to make their own choices and decisions. Enabling to gain a greater sense of independence.</p> <p>Housing First Dundee: A programme operated by a local consortium between Transform Community Development, Salvation Army, Addaction (Scotland) which is funded by Social Bite, which aims to place individuals within their tenancy with support throughout this process.</p>

	<p>Housing First believes that a tenancy means safety and security for individuals and will stop the continuous cycle of the system. This initiative understands that hostels do not provide a stable environment with those with such complex needs and provides them therefore with immediate accommodation and support afterwards. The current programme uses a model based on seven fidelities developed in the USA. Transform Community Development in conjunction with Dundee City Council is developing a Housing First Model based on the model of housing support developed in Finland.</p> <p>FareShare: FareShare reduces food poverty in the UK. Every day, homeless and vulnerable individuals receive meals. The project collects/receives surplus quality food. FareShare redistributes these supplies, free of charge, to community organisations providing residential and day services for disadvantaged groups of people in Dundee, Perth & Kinross and Angus. It also offers valuable training and volunteering opportunities to many of our service users as well as others in the community.</p>
Possible Outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Transform Community Development’s aims to support individuals to secure and manage appropriate tenancies. • All support is person led follows a holistic approach, allowing individuals to be in control of their lives and decide what support they need and find appropriate for their individual needs. • FareShare offers opportunities for residents to volunteer their time to develop and further their skill set. • Transform Community Development works closely with a multitude of external agencies, which helps the residents have access to a variety of expertise and services. This allows residents to become more integrated and involved in the local community.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Brewery Lane & the Seagate is accessed through internal referrals from within other projects within Transform Community Development. Applicants are then taken through a formal interview process with Support Staff before being allocated accommodation. • Housing First Dundee is also a referral-based programme, and has three criteria for acceptance: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Multiple homelessness presentations 2. History of complex needs 3. Willingness of participants to receive support • FareShare works closely with supermarkets chains, food suppliers and community organisations. Volunteers can apply online using a simple contact form and meet with the volunteer coordinator before starting.

Programme Title and Provider	New Routes Mentoring
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	New Routes is a person centered, evidence-led, mentoring support service that is proven to reduce reoffending for those customers that access the service. Delivering across Scotland, the service aims to change attitude and behaviours to offending whilst providing guidance to males in the justice system. Over 50% of our mentors have lived experience of addiction, mental health challenges, homelessness or the justice system

	and this creates an authentic connection with people we work with. Supporting customers six months pre-release followed by six months in the community, New Routes works with over 700 people per year. Support is given for full reintegration back into the community by accessing housing, health care, employment, relationships, mental health, money advice and addictions. New Routes is a Public Social Partnership with the Scottish Government, led by Wise Group. It is delivered by third sector partners including Apex, Families Outside, Sacro, SAMH and Turning Point Scotland, working alongside existing statutory services. Delivery is tailored locally but always to the same standard ensuring consistency of support, regardless of prison or destination.
Possible Outcomes	Support is provided for those leaving prison and reintegrating back into the community. This is achieved by facilitating continued engagement with community services, in addition to addressing attitudes and behaviours. New Routes provides a tailored response to the challenges facing individuals on release from prison including homelessness, addiction support, mental health issues and benefit claims.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	New Routes receive referrals for people receiving a short sentence in prison. We seek to access services once our customer is working with us in the community to allow them specialist support for whatever challenge is faced.

Interventions suitable for	Adults Males aged 16+
Programme Title and Provider	Steps – employability service. Apex service. New Routes – intensive service for males being released out of prison. Service run by Wisegroup with Apex, Sacro, and Turning Point. Was for under 26's but currently working with all ages.
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Both national services. Both cover the whole of Tayside. Steps is an ESF funded service that assists those who have multiple barriers to employment or who are long term unemployed. Our objective is for each individual to complete their action plan by moving into employment, training, more advanced qualifications or progression to stage 3 providers on the Employability Pipeline. New Routes provides offenders with specialist one-to-one support through mentoring, while promoting strong partnerships between other organisations. Our customers are supported by Apex mentors for six months before release, and again post liberation as they reintegrate back into the community.
Possible Outcomes	Employment, training, education, housing, engaging with community, family connections, support for substance usage.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Referral can be made directly to Apex for Steps . Referral can be made through the Prison for New Routes .

Programme Title and Provider	The Salvation Army Employment Plus
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>We are available in Dundee on Monday and Thursday morning, Forfar on Tuesday morning and Thursday afternoon, Arbroath on Wednesday afternoon and Brechin Friday morning. Employment Plus is a National service provided by The Salvation Army. Our programme is developed to allow access to support for anyone who wishes it. We are focused on those furthest from the job market who have multiple barriers to employment such as mental health, learning difficulties, ex-offenders, low skills, long term unemployed, homeless, or employed but requiring improved skills to progress. For those requiring Lifeskills development we have workbooks which cover Tenancy Sustainment, Money Management & Budgeting and Strengthening Relationships. Where there is a need for digital skills we have access to on-line learning, plus we use on-line learning for other employability skills development. Our Employability Development Coordinators (EDC) provide a holistic support creating individual personalised Support/Action Plans alongside the participant. Using strength-based support, the EDC can encourage and guide the participants to achieve their goals by following SMART actions. One of our aims is to identify volunteering opportunities and work experience placements for many of the participants as this will increase their experience, skills, confidence and feeling of self-worth all of which strengthens their CV, their employability and ability to sustain employment. Within Salvation Army in Dundee and Angus we have a Furniture Project and several retail outlets all of which have volunteering posts. When participants achieve paid employment, we offer our in-work support. By continuing to provide support when a participant is in work will improve the experience and sustainability for both participant and employer. There is no time limit to the engagement with our service, therefore those with diverse challenges can take their own time to develop skills and knowledge. For those for whom employment or further education is a less likely outcome, we support them towards a more inclusive, digitally aware and confident life with improved wellbeing. We are currently supporting Community Payback Orders in Glasgow and Aberdeen with an agreement being set up in Ayrshire.</p>
Possible Outcomes:	Improved wellbeing, Increased skills including digital inclusion, volunteering and work placement opportunities, employability training modules, community engagement and employment
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Referrals taken from any agency or self-referrals. Each participant completes an initial assessment to highlight strengths & challenges however there is no criteria for entry to the programme, simply a willingness to engage with employability support.
