BAIL SUPERVISION

Interventions suitable for	People on Bail
Programme Title and Provider	Bail supervision
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Bail supervision is intended to provide a robust and credible alternative to remand where individuals are assessed as needing a level of supervision and support to meet their bail conditions. Bail Supervision is a social work or third sector service whereby individuals who would otherwise be held on remand are released on bail on the condition that they meet with a bail supervisor a specified number of times a week
Possible Outcomes	To: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • reduce the number of individuals remanded to custody; • encourage greater confidence in the use of non-custodial disposals by sentencers as a result of the experience of successful completion of periods on bail supervision; • provide appropriate support to individuals in the community, which minimizes disruption to families, employment and housing, while ensuring compliance with bail conditions.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Criminal Justice Social Work, in collaboration with partners involved in a case as appropriate, should identify individuals, who might otherwise be remanded to custody but based on assessed need and risk can with the support of bail supervision, be safely released on bail.
Where no specific scheme/intervention is available, is there capacity to provide a bespoke service based on judicial request? Please provide details	Bail Supervision can be provided at present as a service on judicial request.

Programme Title and Provider	Unpaid work
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Just CR8 Women's Group. Woman's support worker (SACRO) CPR Training; Fireskills programme; Streetcones Road to Change CPO Connect (Wise Group) Peer Navigator (Substance Issues)
Possible Outcomes	Just CR8 Gender specific to enable females to complete unpaid work hours in a therapeutic setting. CPR/ Fireskills Creating vocational and educational opportunities, giving life skills. Road to Change empowers individuals through the development of communication skills, confidence and self-esteem through the Arts, assisting them to complete UPW hours. CPO Connect is an online programme looking at areas such as Mental health; Physical health; Pro-social networks; Employment; Financial inclusion, supports people to complete other activity hours.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Assessed for suitability at UPW induction, ongoing assessment throughout duration of order.

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: SUPERVISION

Interventions suitable for	Males and Females on Community Payback Supervision Requirement
Programme Title and Provider	This isn't a programme, it is a statutory requirement provided by statutory justice social work services
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	The person will be supervised by an allocated Justice Social Worker Levels of supervision will reflect the intensity of input required to manage and address the issues associated with an individual's offending.
Possible Outcomes	To work with the individual and relevant others to achieve change in the individual's behaviour to encourage desistance from offending behaviour; and to work with the individual to achieve compliance.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Assessed for suitability by the CJ Social Worker when completing the Criminal Justice Social Work Report for the court. An initial analysis of the individual's offending – which considers the pattern, nature, seriousness, and likelihood of offending – will have been carried out at the CJSWR stage. A fuller risk/needs assessment and analysis of the individual's offending will be required in every case where an offender supervision requirement has been imposed, whether the requirement was informed by a CJSWR or not. This fuller assessment, informed by an agreed method or tool such as LS/CMI (Level of Service Case Management Inventory) should be completed within 4 weeks of the requirement being imposed. This assessment should be used to determine the main elements of the case management plan, including the level of supervision necessary to support rehabilitation. Supervision levels should be considered as:- <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Very high intensity • High intensity • Medium intensity • Low intensity

Interventions suitable for	Men who use domestically abusive behaviours in their intimate partner relationships
Programme Title and Provider	Up2U Creating Healthy Relationships Domestic abuse perpetrator groupwork programme
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>Up2U is an innovative, evidence based, perpetrator programme. It uses a goal orientated, strengths based, motivational model to engage individuals, working with their resistance to build strong therapeutic relationships to optimise their commitment to the programme to build safe and healthy relationships</p> <p>Up2U recognises that people are abusive for different underlying reasons ranging from power and control (Duluth Model), learned behaviour, attitudes that promote male dominance and lack of emotional regulation. It is an assessment led approach responding to individual risk, need and responsivity.</p> <p>The programme is for men who use domestically abusive behaviours in their intimate partner relationships.</p> <p>It is suitable for men age 16+ and for people in same sex relationships – who are subject to a standard supervision requirement within a Community Payback Order or license condition.</p> <p>The programme is aimed at assisting men to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> recognise and stop using abusive behaviours <input type="checkbox"/> learn how to cope with and manage overwhelming feelings <input type="checkbox"/> learn to manage the way they think, feel and then act <p>And assist them in having:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> healthier relationships <input type="checkbox"/> children who are less exposed to trauma <input type="checkbox"/> a better understanding of themselves and their emotions <input type="checkbox"/> less involvement with the police and other services <p>This programmed approach offers a tailored package of intervention to address harmful behaviour.</p> <p>Modules and sessions delivered to each individual will be matched to their typology and need with modules and sessions selected from:</p> <p>Module 1 Engagement and Assessment</p> <p>Module 2 Thinking, Feeling and Behaviour</p> <p>Module 3 Relationships</p> <p>Module 4 Skills for Change</p> <p>Targeted Sessions</p>

	<p>Module 5 – Stalking Behaviours</p> <p>Module 6 - Unhealthy Sexualised Behaviours</p> <p>Module 7 - Skills for Change</p> <p>Module 8 - Abuse and Substance Misuse</p>
Possible Outcomes	Assists participants to recognise and stop using abusive behaviours; learn how to cope with and manage overwhelming feelings; learn to manage the way they think, feel and then act. It can also result in healthier relationships; children being less exposed to trauma; a better understanding of themselves and their emotions as well as less involvement with the police and other services.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	The programme is for men who use domestically abusive behaviours in their intimate partner relationships. It is suitable for men age 16+ and for people in same sex relationships – who are subject to a standard supervision requirement within a Community Payback Order or license condition.

Interventions suitable for	Men convicted of a sexual offence and sentenced to a Community Payback Order
Programme Title and Provider	Moving Forward Making Changes (MFMC) Justice Social Work Services
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Moving Forward Making Changes (MFMC) MF: MC is rooted in the ‘Good Lives Model’ (GLM) for offender rehabilitation. The GLM assumes that everyone wants certain primary goods in their life but that, for offenders, this desire manifests itself in harmful ways due to a range of deficits in the offender and/or their environment. It is designed to be delivered in a group format, although it can also be delivered 1:1 or 2:1. It is based on ‘rolling groups’ – men join the group at different times and can be at different stages of the programme at the same time.
Possible Outcomes	Assists participants to recognise and stop using sexual behaviours and to lead a satisfying life, which does not involve harm to others. It will also help participants to: reduce offending; increase self-confidence and self-esteem; improve relationships, and identify positive goals and the steps to achieve them
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Where a man has been convicted of a sexual offence and the Court defers sentence for CJSWRs, eligibility for the programme will be assessed and included in the report based on age, patterns of offending and risk. Once sentenced to a Community Payback Order or License condition the man is assessed on an on-going basis by a Criminal Justice Social Worker in consultation in relation to suitability for progression onto the MFMC group work programme. This assessment will again take into account areas such as patterns of offending, risk of harm / re-offending and motivation to change.

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: TREATMENT: MENTAL HEALTH

Interventions suitable for	Males and Females on Community Payback Supervision Requirement
Programme Title and Provider	Primary Care Mental Health Team.
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	The purpose of imposing a mental health treatment requirement is to ensure that an individual who has been diagnosed with a mental health condition and/or learning disability which contributes to the individual's offending receives support, care and treatment to enable them to improve their mental health in terms of their mental health needs. Justice Social Work and Alcohol and Drug Recovery Services (ADRS) jointly fund a Senior Addiction Nurse, who will attend the JSW office two days a week. The Senior Addiction nurse is also a qualified mental health practitioner who will also meet with her clients who are involved in the Criminal Justice system
Possible Outcomes	This serves to aid compliance with the Order and promote the welfare of the client, whilst addressing their Mental Health and wellbeing issues.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Referral from GP to MHT for assessment. If acute symptoms are displayed contact made by CJSW to both clients GP and duty worker at MH service to have assessment undertaken.

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: TREATMENT: DRUGS

Interventions suitable for	People on community orders with substance dependency issues
Programme Title and Provider	Alcohol and Drugs Recovery
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Justice Social Work and Alcohol and Drug Recovery Services (ADRS) jointly fund a Senior Addiction Nurse, who will attend the JSW office two days a week to meet with clients within the Justice system.
Possible Outcomes	This serves to aid compliance with the Order and promote the welfare of the client The aim of all treatment should be recovery from drug use
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	A drug treatment requirement might be imposed when there are drug issues identified, but where an individual has not established a chronic history of drug misuse. Such a requirement will only be imposed in addition to an offender supervision requirement. Individuals with drug problems, who would not be eligible for a DTTO, because their offending history is not sufficiently high tariff, should be considered by the CJSWR author for such a disposal. This may include, for example, females who generally have a lower tariff offending history or some first time offenders.

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: TREATMENT: ALCOHOL

Interventions suitable for	People on community orders with substance dependency issues
Programme Title and Provider	Alcohol and Drugs Recovery
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Justice Social Work and Alcohol and Drug Recovery Services (ADRS) jointly fund a Senior Addiction Nurse, who will attend the JSW office two days a week to meet with clients within the Justice system.
Possible Outcomes	This serves to aid compliance with the Order and promote the welfare of the client Addressing an individual's alcohol dependence can therefore help address offending behaviour as well as wider personal and social needs.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	An alcohol treatment requirement can be considered where the individual's dependence on alcohol contributes to the offending behaviour. It will only be imposed in addition to an offender supervision requirement. The potential need for this requirement would be identified by CJSW staff in consultation with relevant others involved in the treatment of the individual.

DRUG TREATMENT AND TESTING ORDER (DTTO)

Interventions suitable for	People on community orders with substance dependency issues
Programme Title and Provider	Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO)
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	A DTTO is a high tariff disposal for individuals with drug problems who might otherwise receive a custodial sentence. DTTO is delivered in partnership with Alcohol and Drugs Recovery Service through a shared Senior Addiction Nurse post.
Possible Outcomes	Reduction in substance misuse and related criminal activity
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	The purpose of a DTTO is to target individuals whose offending is a direct result of their drug misuse, for example, those who steal to fund their habit and who are at direct risk of a custodial sentence

STRUCTURED DEFERRED SENTENCE

Interventions suitable for	Men and Women (18+) appearing at court
Programme Title and Provider	Structured Deferred Sentence
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	SDS aims to provide a structured intervention for individuals upon conviction and prior to final sentencing. In East Dunbartonshire SDS, is low tariff, aimed at:

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Adults aged 18+ with lower-level substance use, experiencing poor mental health, and with a limited offending history who may pose a low/medium risk of re-offending and have a less entrenched pattern of offending. • Are at a lower risk of custody • Are not currently subject to a statutory order, and • Are motivated to engage with a short structured intervention
Possible Outcomes	Prevent individuals being further drawn into the justice system. Meeting assessed criminogenic and non-criminogenic needs and building an individual's motivation and capacity for positive change; reducing the frequency or seriousness of offending behaviour; and avoiding premature or unnecessarily intensive periods of supervision in the community.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Assessment of suitability will take place at CJSWR writing. If deemed suitable further assessment and action planning will be via Justice Outcome Star.

THIRD SECTOR PROGRAMMES

Sectarian or Hate Crime

Interventions suitable for	Anyone aged 12 and over who has been charged with a first time and/or a low to moderate level Sectarian or Hate Crime offence
Programme Title and Provider	STOP (Anti-sectarianism / hate crime services); SACRO
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	The service uses a programme, which has been designed to educate and rehabilitate individuals to ensure positive, achievable and sustainable changes in attitudes and behaviours. The programme can be delivered on a one-to-one basis or to groups.
Possible Outcomes	Positive, achievable and sustainable changes in attitudes and behaviours.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	The service is available to anyone aged 12 and over who has been charged with a first time and/or a low to moderate level Sectarian or Hate Crime offence.
Relevant information re. funding for the programme	Justice Services do not pay for the service. It is provided in the spirit of partnership working. Capacity however is limited.

Community Payback Order

Interventions suitable for	Open to anyone on a community payback order.
Programme Title and Provider	New Routes; Wise Group
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Specialist one-to-one support through, Peer Mentoring service, bail supervision

Possible Outcomes	To support individuals on orders to develop their independence and social skills, link to appropriate services, explore aspirations, identify goals and put in place achievable steps to improve their quality of life.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Open to anyone on a community payback order.
Relevant information re. funding for the programme	Funded by Scottish Government

Domestic Abuse

Interventions suitable for	Partners of domestic abuse perpetrators on Up2U programme
Programme Title and Provider	Up2U non abusive partner support; East Dunbartonshire Women's Aid
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Support for partners of domestic abuse perpetrators on Up2U programme
Possible Outcomes	As part of the UP2U programme, we will contact non-abusive partners, which will allow support workers to provide a range of information regarding specialist agencies. Some of our partner agencies, like East Dunbartonshire Women's Aid, will offer support to the non-abusive partner, separately from the UP2U programme.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	A letter is sent to the non-abusive partner. This is entirely the individual's choice and support will be person-led, offering safety planning and emotional support which can be delivered in either 1:1 or group settings
Relevant information re. funding for the programme	No specific funding attached, delivered in partnership spirit.

Women

Interventions suitable for	Women aged 18 and over who have live criminal justice involvement in the last 12 months
Programme Title and Provider	218 Project; Turning Point Scotland
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Female criminal justice service residential facility offering support for drug/alcohol use, offending behaviour, physical/ mental health, accommodation and social needs.
Possible Outcomes	To provide a safe environment in which women can address offending behaviour; tackle the underlying causes of offending behaviour; help women avert crises in their lives; and enable women to move on and reintegrate into society.

Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	The assessment process has seven stages beginning with an initial assessment of the referral. Following this an appointment is made for a woman offender to attend the service to begin the assessment process. Once fully assessed a comprehensive, individually tailored care plan is created

Men/ Substance Misuse

Interventions suitable for	Men 18+ on a Community Order in serious risk of breaching their order due to problematic substance use, or other associated need linked to vulnerability.
Programme Title and Provider	Wayfinders : Paving the way to positive destinations
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>A commissioned organisation will provide a Peer Navigator(Justice) funded through the DDTF to support men aged 18 years+ subject to community based disposals and those returning to the community after custodial sentences in the East Dunbartonshire area.</p> <p>The Peer Navigator will have lived expertise, provide a recovery based approach to support that is person centred, strengths based and trauma informed. Using relationship-based practice to develop supportive and meaningful relationships with clients, many of whom are often difficult to engage. It is envisaged that these relationships will serve to engender hope, build self-efficacy and enable clients to achieve their good life goals/positive outcomes.</p>
Possible Outcomes	<p>Break the cycle of repeat offending by addressing the root causes of offending behaviour. In achieving positive outcomes, it is envisaged that the peer navigator will seek to break the cycle of chaos often present in many clients' lives by adhering to three broad principles:</p> <p>Connecting Developing therapeutic relationships and linking in with appropriate services. This will be particularly critical in the first 48 hours of someone leaving custody and within the seven day period of a non-fatal overdose.</p> <p>Supporting Supporting clients to engage with services, inclusive of recovery, mental health services. The peer navigator will be an integral part of any risk management/treatment plan formulated.</p> <p>Stabilise Ongoing support to ensure that the clients are empowered to continue to engage with services and are invested in their keep safe/relapse prevention plans.</p> <p>The long term ambition is to eradicate Drug Related Deaths in East Dunbartonshire. Having an established and resourced peer navigator network embedded within East Dunbartonshire will contribute to a long term system change.</p>

Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Assessment will be completed by the Peer Navigator through the Drug/Alcohol Outcome Star.
Relevant information re. funding for the programme	This is a 2 year Test of Change funded initially through the Drugs Death Task Force
