Interventions suitable for	Those at risk of remand
Programme Title and Provider	Bail supervision
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Delivered in house as the uptake for the previous third sector provision was extremely low. Respond to the needs of the court as required. Priority is given to vulnerable groups such as those with mental health problems, women accused, single parents, people with carer responsibilities, people with substance misuse issues and young people aged between 16 and 21. Other individuals who would suffer extreme difficulties if remanded to custody, are assessed as not being a risk to public protection or are assessed as not being at risk of self-harm are also targeted. Dumfries and Galloway Criminal Justice, work with community justice partners and third sector providers, to improve access to appropriate support services related to bail supervision.
Possible Outcomes	Compliance with bail conditions. Engagement with Criminal Justice and other agencies.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	<p>An assessment of need and risk identify those that, with the support of Bail Supervision can be safely released on bail. Dumfries and Galloway Criminal Justice Social Work apply professional judgement on where bail supervision would improve outcomes. We take account of the needs and impact on the individual and others, including children and family members, while ensuring risk and safety implications are fully assessed. The Bail Supervision Assessment Report should contain an action plan for supervision this should directly correlate to the contributing factors associated with the individual's risk.</p> <p>The action plan should detail:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •level of contact to be maintained at each phase in the bail supervision •the frequency of reviews •The role of individual subject to supervision, the supervising officer and any other third party

Unit-based projects (joinery, art, craft), home working when no other options are available for a variety of reasons. Specific groups are available for light duties dependent on the need of the individual. A women's only group is available also.
Possible Outcomes	Skills used on project or placement learnt and developed. Reparation to local community. Benefits from involvement in structured, pro-social activity with links to local community. Team working skills developed; sense of achievement when individual tasks and overall project completed with positive feedback from project recipients.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	No longer assess for suitability per se as unpaid work is a universal option with the work tailored to each individual wherever possible. Assessment considers what projects or placements are available to match the risk/need/responsivity and desired outcomes for an individual.

Possible Outcomes	Reduce the risk of reoffending and complete the order effectively. Specific areas of work will be delivered depending on the need of the individual and their desired outcome; this varies depending on the person being supervised.

	Both accredited and non-accredited programmes are offered across the region. Accredited programmes include MFMC and Caledonian for those who meet the specific criteria.
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>As stated both accredited and non-accredited programmes are offered. Accredited programmes include Moving Forward Making Changes and Caledonian for those who meet the specific criteria. The Caledonian System is an integrated approach to address men's domestic abuse, improving the lives of the men but also women and children who have been effected. It does this by working with men convicted of domestic abuse related offences to reduce their re-offending while offering integrated services to women and children. The Caledonian model takes the form of an intervention system comprising: the men's programme, women's service and children's service. The men's programme uses a person-centred approach coupled with cognitive behavioural techniques to encourage men to recognise their abuse and take responsibility for it within their relationship with the ex/partners and children. It is aimed at adult men, over 16 years, whose abuse has been to a female partner or ex-partner. Men can be referred by the Court to this two-year programme if they have been convicted of offences involving domestic abuse. The programme is statutory and men are required to attend.</p> <p>There needs to be a programme requirement following appropriate assessment to access programmes. Non-accredited programmes include: an updated version of Constructs either as a programme requirement or not, targeting male offenders. Women's Group (GROW) with or without a programme requirement depending on whether this is helpful. The Women's Programme is currently only available in the East of the region but is also being developed in the West.</p>
Possible Outcomes	Order completed and risk of reoffending reduced. Participants reflect on their behaviour and develop an understanding of why they have offended. Individuals learn new skills which will help them to change their behaviour and move on to an offence free future successfully.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Offence specific assessment tools used to consider suitability for particular programmes - Stable & Acute for Moving Forward making Changes; SARA for Caledonian Programme; (Level of Service Case Management Inventory) LSCMI for Constructs and Women's Programme. When Caledonian or MFMC is being considered programme specific assessment reports are produced on request from the court to enable assessment for suitability to be undertaken. Programme Requirement MUST be imposed for Caledonian or MFMC; the requirement is optional and proposed on a case by case basis for Constructs and GROW.

Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Moving On is primarily a one-to-one employability programme. However, Personal Development Mentors can also support individuals to increase their life skills, access other services and write letters of disclosure to prospective employers or training providers, disclosing offences in the most appropriate way. This also involves individuals learning the relevance of their conviction to the job or training being applied for. The main bases are in Stranraer and Dumfries, travel expenses are reimbursed for those wishing to attend out with these areas.

Programme Title and Provider	Shine: Apex Scotland
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	Shine is a national public social partnership service that provides mentors to support women on an individual basis to move their life forward in a positive way and reduce reoffending. Shine is available to women prior to and post liberation, as well as to those on Community Payback Orders who are at risk of breach. The service is available across Dumfries and Galloway.
Possible Outcomes	Increased confidence and self-esteem. Improved relationships with family and friends. Increased life skills. Reduction in alcohol or drug use. Decrease in offending behaviour. Completion of order.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	The service is available to any woman serving a custodial sentence up to 6 months prior to release and 6 months post release. Women can be referred directly from prison or by their JSW staff member. The service is also available to women undertaking community payback orders to help them maintain and complete their order. This is a one-to-one mentoring service where women are supported to work on their life skills, relationship, health, mental health and other identified goals. Outcomes and journey travelled are captured using the Outcome Star tool
Relevant information re. funding for the programme	Part of a National Mentoring Service for Women, Apex is the local delivery partner. This was originally funded through the Reducing Reoffending Fund.

Interventions suitable for	Men serving short term custodial sentences. There are some exclusions to this; sex offenders cannot be referred.

Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>New Routes is another one of the national public social partnership mentoring services. New Routes works with men serving short term custodial sentences. All referrals come directly from custody for all men returning to D&G across the prison estate; support then continues in the community.</p> <p>Apex took over the New Routes mentoring service for men in Dumfries and Galloway in August 2020 although it was not until October that their mentor could access the prison due to delays with enhanced disclosure.</p>

	Prior to this time the service was provided on a part time basis by Wise Group; numbers were low with people mainly being supported whilst still in custody. Over the last year numbers have increased substantially. New Routes Mentors are based in Stranraer and Dumfries. Throughcare services support people prior to and post liberation helping to identify and overcome barriers which may impact on their ability to move on with their lives successfully, engage with support services to help address barriers and build skills and resilience and reduce or stop offending.

In 2018, after a vote by Service Users, they have added Mental Health Support to their services.</p>
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p><u>Independent Living Support (ILS)</u> is a small local charity with bases in Dumfries and Stranraer. Our purpose is to promote 'simply surviving to actively thriving' by offering practical, social and emotional support to people from all backgrounds.</p> <p>The programmes they have developed have been in response to the needs of clients. ILS has developed expertise in working effectively with young and vulnerable people. Their culture is a supportive one. The relationships they build are genuine and lasting. Individuals return to ILS because they know they will listen, be non-judgemental and support their efforts in a way that works for them. Much of this work involves supporting people to re-engage with their communities and to progress towards independence. Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>The Lifeskills Project:</p> <p>Support in Mind Scotland's multi award-winning Life Skills Project in Dumfries provides opportunities for personal development and employability skills improvement, through a combination of group work and 1:1 support for adults who are affected by mental health issues.</p> <p>Activities are aimed at improving, or in many cases rediscovering skills that allow those taking part to lead a more active and worthwhile role in society. A range of employability skills are embedded into activities that allow people to be creative and imaginative, as well as having some fun along the way.</p> <p>Tasks which encourage the use of these skills are all part of the group sessions, which range from art, crafts, sewing, digital photography, creative writing and IT based activities, through to discussion groups, driving test theory and literacy and numeracy. With all of these activities, strenuous efforts are always made to produce a tangible 'outcome'. Many of these outcomes are then sold through the Project shop which is in the same building.</p> <p>C U Thru</p> <p>C U Thru is an early intervention project in Dumfries & Galloway for 16-30 year olds experiencing mental ill health. They can support people to rebuild confidence and self-esteem, help them feel more in control of their own life and feel able to make positive decisions to improve quality of life.</p>

They provide a friendly relaxed atmosphere, a safe place to focus on recovery and help to work towards your own development, usually on a short-term focused basis.

Support to:

- Deal with practical barriers e.g housing and benefits.
- Explore coping strategies and problem solving techniques.
- Increase your employability, and access to paid and unpaid training, employment and education.

Support in Mind Scotland Stranraer

Resource Centre – at our new base in the Millennium Centre (George Street) we provide a safe environment for people to receive advice and talk about issues that are affecting them as well as being able to participate in activities and socialise with people in a similar situation to themselves. We facilitate numerous regular activities within the centre, such as cooking, basic computer sessions Tai Chi and a men’s group, but we also encourage people to get involved with what’s going on in the community including day trips, local outings, swimming, walking and gym sessions. We accept referrals from the Community Mental Health Teams and other allied health professionals, including referrals from Social Work.

Carers Support Group - Carers Support for the West of Dumfries and Galloway. Support is provided for family members who care for someone with mental illness. Group Support meetings are facilitated in Stranraer and Newton Stewart on a monthly basis with one to one appointments available on request. This is a regular group for people who support someone who is experiencing mental ill health. The group meet to talk to others in similar situations to themselves and receive staff support, information about services and events in the local area and further afield. They also participate in consultations relating to mental health and carers legislation. One to one support is also available should anyone require this. The group is open to anyone supporting someone affected by mental ill health. A self-referral is required for this service.

Employability Service – this service provides support for people who are in employment (supported, paid or voluntary), training, education or are working towards any of these. As well as one to one and group support, service users are supported to attend appointments with DWP, CAB and FIAT.

For those who are not yet ready to go into employment, there is a group for people wanting to gain an SVQ qualification, learn some life skills or apply for ITA grants to access college courses and to attend short courses in local libraries.

For those already in employment, regulations state that if a person is in supported employment, they can only continue this for more than 12 months if they are supported by a third sector organisation. We act as this organisation. We accept referrals from the Community Mental Health Teams and other allied health professionals, including referrals from Social Work.

	<p>Newton Stewart Resource Centre</p> <p>Outreach – a one to one service for people needing support to carry out everyday tasks and continue to live independently. This support includes emotional, social and practical support. Examples are menu planning, shopping, organising bills and finances, support to organise and attend appointments, developing skills, maintaining mental and physical health and wellbeing. We accept referrals from the Community Mental Health Teams and other allied health professionals, including referrals from Social Work.</p> <p>Carers Support Group - this is a regular group for people who support someone who is experiencing mental ill health. The group meet to talk to others in similar situations to themselves and receive staff support, information about services and events in the local area and further afield. They also participate in consultations relating to mental health and carers legislation. One to one support is also available should anyone require this.</p> <p>The group is open to anyone supporting someone affected by mental ill health. A self-referral is required for this service.</p>
