BAIL SUPERVISION

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>All individuals over 16 years old and over who are appearing from custody across the Lanarkshire Courts (Airdrie, Hamilton, and Lanark).</p>
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Bail supervision-delivered by South Lanarkshire Council for Lanarkshire residents</p> <p>SACRO-Intensive support for persons who require additional support to manage bail supervision due to unmet welfare needs.</p> <p>Whole System Approach Service for 16-21-year-olds offers bail assessments and supervision for this age group.</p>
<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>Bail supervision is intended to provide a robust and credible alternative to the use of remand and is aimed at supporting people to adhere to conditions of bail and to reduce the risk of further offending. Dedicated social workers and social work assistants from our Lanarkshire Court Service and our Whole Systems Approach (WSA) team (16–21-year-olds) can offer bail assessments to the court, which are person centred and will consider the individuals risks and needs in order to tailor an individualised action plan.</p> <p>If bail supervision is imposed contact will take place twice per week and the agreed action plan progressed with referrals being made to appropriate supports and services that are in-keeping with the individual’s needs. There is a welfare and relationship-based approach provided to those engaging with bail supervision and the action plan will be reviewed at regular intervals to ensure this meets the needs of the individual.</p>
<p>Possible Outcomes</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To reduce the number of people being remanded to custody. • Increased opportunity to access appropriate supports and services that can reduce identified areas of risk/need at an earlier stage. • Improvements to the welfare and safety of the individual and increased protection for members of the community impacted by offending behaviour. • Improved opportunities, health, and wellbeing.
<p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p>	<p>Any individual appearing in the Lanarkshire courts, who is over 16 and is at risk of remand, can be assessed for bail supervision. The Lanarkshire court team will conduct an assessment with the individual while they remain in custody, and they will conduct the necessary checks of social work systems and make contact with any relevant people to assess suitability and to create an action plan which is in-keeping with the individual’s needs. A bail supervision assessment report is then provided to the Sheriff for their consideration and if bail supervision is agreed arrangements are made to progress with the agreed action plan.</p>

	<p>In South Lanarkshire if the individual who is subject to bail supervision is over 21 years old, they will be supported by the court social work team and any other relevant services considered appropriate. If the individual is aged between 16-21 then bail supervision will be provided by the Whole Systems Approach (WSA) team who work specifically with young people.</p> <p>SACRO's bail supervision service offers additional supports to any individual subject to bail supervision, with a particular focus on those where there are more complex risks/needs identified. The SACRO bail supervision worker will work jointly with the court team and Whole Systems Approach (WSA) team on such action plans.</p>
<p>Where no specific scheme/intervention is available, is there capacity to provide a bespoke service based on judicial request? Please provide details</p>	<p>There would be the opportunity to tailor a bespoke service, but this may take time to ensure the support requested is suitable or available. Depending on the needs of the individual, negotiations could take place with social work, housing providers and/or third sector partners. The type of tailored service would depend on the needs of the service user and the capacity of services to respond to such requests.</p>

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: UNPAID WORK

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>South Lanarkshire residents aged 16 and over who are subject to a Community Payback Order (CPO).</p>
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Unpaid Work provided by South Lanarkshire</p> <p>Unpaid Work by Action for Children</p>

<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>Workshops on a range of areas including woodwork, joinery, horticulture, cookery, and knitting are delivered from this base. Remote unpaid work has involved creating safety blankets from crisp packets and the creation of rugs made from pre-loved items of clothing, which are then used to provide rugs to local animal charities. Another remote project is for pathfinder dogs where those completing unpaid work support a recycling bottle top process. This aids the charity to access funds to help train guide dogs for those who experience sight loss. An additional remote unpaid work project is the diamond art project which provides an opportunity for those on unpaid work to create works of art using gemstones. Completed artwork is then donated to a range of charities. Bread making is also facilitated in the base and the products from these initiatives are distributed to a range of settings including foodbanks, homeless projects and residential care facilities for adults and children. Unpaid work in the community also involves restoring and improving the local greenspace to support safe and healthy outdoor living spaces. Activities focus on restorative work in areas such as parks, forest areas and walkways throughout all of South Lanarkshire.</p> <p>As part of other activity, employability workshops are facilitated from unpaid work to support service users back into employment. This includes access to IT equipment within the base and supports are provided to enable people to update or create a C.V and to support people to undertake learning courses. This includes access to open university courses and other on-line courses such as living life to the full. Wellbeing nurses also attend to support service users to access the health supports they require. A wellbeing work pack has also been developed to ensure service users welfare needs are fully attended to.</p> <p>Action for Children support our 16–25-year old’s, in acquiring skills for employment in for example building, hairdressing and cookery. Unpaid work also has a dedicated educational gardener and access to allotments. Opportunities are provided to those undertaking unpaid work to acquire skills in horticulture through this placement.</p> <p>Personalised placements are also provided for service users who struggle in group settings. Placements have been offered in a range of charity shops throughout South Lanarkshire.</p>
<p>Possible Outcomes</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Those undertaking unpaid work report to being more confident and ready for employment due to improved confidence, knowledge, and skills. • Improvements in mental, physical health and wellbeing due to having had support to access services to address welfare needs. • Increased opportunities for learning and increased employability skills. • Increased connectivity between those undertaking unpaid work and their communities. • Improved outcomes for the local communities and charities who benefit from tasks undertaken by those completing unpaid work. This includes improved greenspace areas, increased funding for local charities through work undertaken by those completing unpaid

	work, and provision of necessities to charities who help animals, adults, and children throughout South Lanarkshire.
Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	<p>Social workers completing Criminal Justice Social Work Reports (CJSWR's) will assess the suitability for those awaiting sentence to complete unpaid work. This can be as part of a standalone unpaid work order, or as part of a combination order where a supervision requirement is also part of the Community Payback Order (CPO).</p> <p>Courts can also impose level 1 orders without a Criminal Justice Social Work report(CJSWR).</p>

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: SUPERVISION

Interventions suitable for	South Lanarkshire residents aged 16 and over who are subject to a Community Payback Order (CPO).
Programme Title and Provider	Community Payback Order (CPO) supervision is provided on a statutory basis and in line with national outcomes and standards by social workers within South Lanarkshire's Justice Services.
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>An action plan will be developed for all individuals sentenced to a supervision requirement as part of a Community Payback Order (CPO). The areas that will be addressed during the order will be outlined in an action plan informed by the Level of Service Case Management Inventory (LSCMI) assessment, which assesses individual risks and needs.</p> <p>South Lanarkshire has developed a Structured Supervision Programme (SSP), which is a modular programme that focuses on elements of Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT). The modules support the individual to explore a range of areas that can aid their awareness and explore ways to access appropriate supports to reduce the risk of further offending behaviour and to address any unmet welfare needs, whilst reducing areas of risk.</p> <p>Interventions can include working to secure appropriate accommodation, employability supports, maximising income/managing debt or to access appropriate local supports and services, including health and recovery services.</p>
Possible Outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reduce the risk to the individual and the community from the impact of offending behaviour. • To reduce the risk of further offending behaviour. • To improve opportunities and to create safer communities. • To support access to appropriate local services and supports for those with often complex risks and needs. • To help individuals to achieve better outcomes and to meet their full potential. • To improve health and wellbeing

Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	Individuals will be assessed for supervision during the Criminal Justice Social Work Report (CJSWR) process. As part of the CJSWR process an individual will be assessed using the LSCMI :SV which is the initial screening version of the LSCMI risk/need assessment tool. This provides an analysis of risk/needs which initiates and agreed level of intensity which directly correlates to the contact levels required for the purposes of supervision. The tool also provides a summary of identified risks/needs that will formulate an initial action plan that will be subject to regular review throughout the supervision period.
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COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: PROGRAMME

Interventions suitable for	Adult males convicted of domestic abuse offences.
Programme Title and Provider	Caledonian System programme The Caledonian programme is delivered by a dedicated Caledonian Systems Delivery Team (CSDT) in South Lanarkshire. The team comprises of three different components, where the social work Justice team, the women's service (provided by Women's Aid), and the children's service (provided by CIRCLE) all work together as part of a multi-agency team.
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>The Caledonian programme is a modular programme which focuses on work undertaken with men who have a pattern of offending behaviour which is domestically abusive in nature.</p> <p>South Lanarkshire delivers the Caledonian programme in partnership with Women's Aid and CIRCLE, providing a service not only to the men placed on the programme but also with the women and children who have been negatively affected by the behaviour.</p> <p>The programme is delivered on an individual and group work basis, with men being supported to complete a pre-group work programme prior to modules being progressed. The programme involves supporting men to reduce their involvement in offending whilst improving the safety of women and children who have been impacted by the men's behaviours.</p>
Possible Outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reduction in the frequency, severity, and impact of offending on victims and the community. • Improved safety for women and children affected by domestic abuse. • To help men involved in abusive behaviours to develop increased awareness and to develop new and improved strategies and techniques to aid them to refrain from further abusive behaviours. • To help keep communities safe from abusive behaviours.

Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention	<p>An assessment for inclusion in the Caledonain Programme will take place at the Criminal Justice Social Work Report (CJSWR) stage. Those who have a pattern of convictions for matters that involve domestic abuse or where there is evidence of a pattern of involvement in behaviours associated with domestic abuse, will be assessed via an initial screening process by the report author and a member of the centralised Caledonian System team. If an individual is assessed as suitable for the programme a full Caledonain system assessment will then be conducted.</p> <p>Individuals who progress following initial screening will undertake a further assessment process and a Caledonain assessment report will be provided. This will include a proposed action plan in terms of programmed work and will include plans for all elements of the service to ensure that appropriate levels of support are provided to the individual as well as those impacted by the abusive behaviours.</p>
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COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: TREATMENT: MENTAL HEALTH

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>Adults living within the South Lanarkshire area who are aged 16 or over and who require medical treatment in relation to diagnosed mental health conditions as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Severe and persistent disorders associated with significant cognitive disability, predominantly psychosis such as schizophrenia, severe and recurrent depression and bipolar disorder. • Longer term mental health disorders which considerably impact on functioning and are characterised by poor treatment adherence requiring proactive follow up. • Any moderate to severe mental disorder where there is also a significant risk of self-harm, harm to others or risk of suicide, self-neglect or vulnerability to exploitation. • Disorders requiring skilled or intensive treatments not available in primary care. • Complex problems of management and engagement, including those who meet the criteria for an assertive outreach function and severe disorders of personality. • First presentation psychosis. • Complex trauma.
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Mental health treatment provisions in South Lanarkshire are provided by local G.P services, Community Mental Health Teams(CMHT) and local psychiatric services via NHS Lanarkshire.</p>
<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>Treatment plans are created and tailored to meet the individuals needs and will be subject to regular monitoring by health and social care professionals based within local Community Mental Health Teams (CMHT). Those within the Community Mental Health Team (CMHT) will provide the agreed treatment plans.</p> <p>This will include the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Signposting, advice, and guidance – people who are referred to the Community Mental Health Team who do not require further intervention may benefit from further information about local/national resources or onward referral to a more appropriate service. • Interventions for people with complex and acute mental health needs – people who have been assessed as having complex mental health needs are likely to require a range of services and

	<p>interventions, in order to promote recovery, prevent deterioration and maintain an optimal level of health and social inclusion.</p>
<p>Possible Outcomes</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Individuals are provided with an assessment and a treatment plan that is created in line with their individual needs. • Improved mental health and wellbeing for the individual. • Reduced risks and needs associated with the symptoms related to the impact of the individual's mental health condition. • Access to appropriate supports, services, and treatment. • Ongoing outpatient review from Consultant Psychiatrist • Referral to Psychological Therapy Team for psychological intervention • Allocation for Community Psychiatric Nurse • Improvements in mental health functioning specifically in relation to condition referral based upon combined with reduction of risk to patient/others • Discharge from CMHT to Primary Care • Onward referral to Third sector/Voluntary Organisations
<p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p>	<p>An individual would be assessed for a mental health treatment requirement at the Criminal Justice Social Work Report (CJSWR) stage, if there is evidence that an individual may require mental health treatment in order to reduce areas of identified risks/needs.</p> <p>Initially the report author would request an up-to-date psychiatric assessment within the court report and would request a period of deferral to allow this assessment to take place. The court would thereafter request a psychiatric report from a private psychiatrist from the local availability list. The report author would thereafter liaise with the designated psychiatrist conducting the report, as well as the local Mental Health Officer (MHO) based within the locality Community Mental Health Team (CMHT). This will allow any proposed treatment plan to be agreed and a supplementary report provided to the court along with the independent psychiatric assessment that would detail the proposed treatment plan.</p> <p>A range of interventions in a treatment plan may include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Depression management, - Suicide prevention strategies & safety planning - Anxiety management techniques - Graded Exposure - Relapse prevention. - CBT - Medication management.

COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: TREATMENT: DRUGS

<p>Interventions suitable for</p>	<p>Individuals who reside in the South Lanarkshire area, who are aged 16 and over and who require treatment in relation to the impact of their problematic drug use or dependence.</p>
<p>Programme Title and Provider</p>	<p>Community Addiction Recovery Service (CAREs)- provide assessment and treatment options for those considered to require tier 3 level supports and services. This includes people who are dependent or severely affected by drugs (Cocaine, Heroin, Illicit Benzodiazepines, Cannabis, NPS, Stimulants, Solvents). The CAREs service offers both medical and social work supports for those experiencing challenges in relation to drug dependency and those severely impacted by drug use.</p> <p>South Lanarkshire Beacons and Liber8- provide assessment and treatment options for those considered to require tier 2 level supports and services. This service comprises of peer support networks coupled with therapeutic interventions and access to psychotherapy.</p> <p>Turning Point “Reachout” service- provide assessment and treatment options for those considered to require tier 3&2 level supports and services. This service comprises of peer support networks coupled with therapeutic interventions and access to psychotherapy.</p> <p>Regen:FX “The GIVIT”- provide assessment and treatment options for those aged 16-25 and operate a youth work approach and provide outreach services to young people who experience challenges as a result of their drug use. This service is aimed at young people who require tier 2 level supports and services.</p>
<p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p>	<p>There are a range of options available to those who require supports in relation to their drug use and recovery in South Lanarkshire and a tiered approach to services means that individuals are directed to treatment options, according to their level of need.</p> <p>Those assessed as requiring tier 3 level services will generally be referred to the Community Addiction Recovery Service (CAREs) who will undertake an initial assessment of needs. A treatment plan will be agreed, and support options discussed. Individuals can then access multi-disciplinary supports with access to both a team comprised of both medical and social work staff. Services include</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Psycho- Social Interventions.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Motivational Intervention • Range of harm reduction interventions (BBV Testing, Hepatitis B Immunisation, Naloxone provision, OD Training) • Health and Well Being review and support • Substitute Prescribing • Access to Occupational Therapy, Psychiatry and Psychology if required. • Linkage to Recovery Communities • Linkage to Employability. • Assessment and funding of Residential Rehabilitation placement if suitable. • In patient detox if required. <p>Justice Support Assistants (JSAs) who have lived experience also provide supports to those who are on a Community Payback Order (CPO) where problematic drug use has been a feature. They will provide additional welfare-based supports and create a link between the individual and the local services available.</p> <p>Those assessed as requiring tier 2 services are provided with a range of options and choices in terms of service provisions that may best meet their needs locally. This includes the South Lanarkshire Beacons, Turning Point and for younger people Regen:FX's "The GIVIT" Service. All services aim to support those impacted negatively by their drug use to access the supports and services that are in-keeping with their needs. There are people with a level of lived experience providing supports and there are pathways within each service for individuals to access medical and therapeutic treatment options that will support them in their journey towards recovery.</p>
<p>Possible Outcomes</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reduced harms and increased safety in relation to drug use. • Reduction in the negative impact of drug use on the individual, their families, and their communities. • Opportunities provided for people to be able to connect better to their communities and to benefit from those with lived experience to aid their own recovery. • Increased opportunities to improve health and wellbeing.
<p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p>	<p>At the Criminal Justice Social Work Report (CJSWR) stage and where drug use is identified as being a problematic or negative feature in someone's life, discussions will take place with the individual about the different service options available to them so that the individual is able to make an informed decision on the treatment option or service which would best meet their needs.</p> <p>Appropriate referrals are thereafter made to the chosen service and an assessment process is conducted with the individual. Thereafter a</p>

	treatment plan will be agreed, and lead professionals identified. An agreed action plan will thereafter be included within the report to court that would allow a drug treatment requirement to be considered and imposed by the sentencing sheriff.
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COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: TREATMENT: ALCOHOL

Interventions suitable for	Individuals who reside in the South Lanarkshire area, who are aged 16 and over and who require treatment in relation to the impact of their problematic alcohol use or dependence on alcohol.
Programme Title and Provider	<p>Community Addiction Recovery Service (CAREs)- provide assessment and treatment options for those considered to require tier 3 level supports and services. This service offers both medical and social work supports for those experiencing challenges in relation to alcohol dependence.</p> <p>South Lanarkshire Beacons and Liber8- provide assessment and treatment options for those considered to require tier 2 level supports and services. This service comprises of peer support networks coupled with therapeutic interventions and access to psychotherapy.</p> <p>Turning Point- provide assessment and treatment options for those considered to require tiers 3 & 2 level supports and services. This service comprises of peer support networks coupled with therapeutic interventions and access to psychotherapy.</p> <p>Regen:FX “The GIVIT”- provide assessment and treatment options for those aged 16-25 and operate a youth work approach and provide outreach services to young people who experience challenges as a result of their alcohol use. This service is aimed at young people who require tier 2 level supports and services.</p>
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>There are a range of options available to those who require supports in relation to their alcohol use and recovery in South Lanarkshire and a tiered approach to services means that individuals are directed to treatment options, according to their level of need.</p> <p>Those assessed as requiring tier 3 level services will generally be referred to the Community Addiction Recovery Service (CAREs) who will undertake an initial assessment of needs. A treatment plan will be agreed, and support options discussed. Individuals can access multi-disciplinary supports with access to a team comprised of both medical and social work</p>

	<p>staff via the Community Addiction Recovery service (CAREs). They will provide additional welfare-based supports and create a link between the individual and the local services available.</p> <p>Those assessed as requiring tier 2 services are provided with a range of options and choices in terms of service provisions that may best meet their needs locally. This includes the South Lanarkshire Beacons, Turning Point's "Reachout" service and for younger people Regen:FX's "The GIVIT" service. All services aim to support those impacted negatively by their alcohol use to access the supports and services that are in-keeping with their needs. There are people with a level of lived experience providing supports and there are pathways within each service for individuals to access medical and therapeutic treatment options that will support them in their journey towards recovery.</p>
<p>Possible Outcomes</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reduced harms and increased safety in relation to alcohol use. • Reduction in the negative impact of alcohol use on the individual, their families, and their communities. • Opportunities provided for people to be able to connect better to their communities and to benefit from those with lived experience to aid their own recovery. • Increased opportunities to improve health and wellbeing.
<p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p>	<p>At the Criminal Justice Social Work Report (CJSWR) stage and where alcohol use is identified as being a problematic or negative feature in someone's life, discussions will take place with the individual about the different service options available to them so that the individual is able to make an informed decision on the treatment option or service which would best meet their needs.</p>

	Appropriate referrals are thereafter made to the chosen service and an assessment process is conducted with the individual. Thereafter a treatment plan will be agreed, and lead professionals identified. An agreed action plan will thereafter be included within the report to court that would allow an alcohol treatment requirement to be considered and imposed by the sentencing sheriff.
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DRUG TREATMENT AND TESTING ORDER (DTTO)

Interventions suitable for	Individuals who reside in the South Lanarkshire area, who are aged 16 and over and who have developed a pattern of offending behaviour that is directly linked to a pattern of long-standing problematic drug use.
Programme Title and Provider	Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO) – DTTO services are provided by a partnership team comprising of a centralised social work service who work alongside medical practitioners based within South Lanarkshire’s Community Addiction Recovery Service (CAREs).
Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available	<p>Drug Treatment and Testing Orders (DTTO) are delivered in partnership with the Community Addiction Recovery Services (CAREs). Intensive support from social work, CAREs and a dedicated GP are offered to those who receive a Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO). Regular oral swab testing is undertaken with the individual as part of an agreed treatment plan and appropriate medication provided to aid recovery. Twice weekly contact takes place between the individual and service providers within the team. The DTTO provides individuals with access to substance use support services via dedicated and experienced substance use workers. In addition, there is regular support provided by qualified social workers with regular access to a dedicated general practitioner and the local CAREs nursing team. Individuals will also be able to access psychiatric and psychological inputs via the Community Addiction Recovery Service (CAREs).</p> <p>Regular court reviews are scheduled to monitor the progress of the treatment plan and regular update reports are provided to the court by the social work team. People on a DTTO are encouraged and supported to engage with local recovery services within their community and will be supported to access a range of supports including employability services, health services and a range of pro-social activities.</p>

Action for Children (AFC), Regen:FX and Includem work in partnership with the Whole System Approach (WSA) team in South Lanarkshire to deliver additional support.
