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BAIL SUPERVISION

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| Interventions suitable for | Male and Female, age 16+ who are at risk of remand to custody and have a presenting need which would require support. |
| Programme Title and Provider | Bail supervision |

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| <p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p> | <p>Bail supervision schemes are designed to minimise the numbers of accused held on remand in custody pending trial or for reports after conviction, who subject to safeguards in respect of public safety, could be released on bail to the community pending their further court hearing (SG 2008).</p> <p>Male and Female, age 16+ who are at risk of remand to custody. Contact is initially three times per week consisting of two office based and one home visit.</p> |
| <p>Possible Outcomes</p> | <p>Reduce remand to custody and address health / addiction needs via referrals to community-based services. Increase awareness of local community services/organisations/activities to improve well-being and social inclusion if required.</p> |
| <p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p> | <p>Consent agreed during assessment undertaken at Court by Social Work staff who approve intended address and risks associated with the individual i.e. mental health, physical health, compliance with current or previous orders.</p> <p>Referrals are made to relevant community-based services when appropriate and intervention can include group work or 1:1 work if the individual consents.</p> |

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| <p>Interventions suitable for</p> | <p>Male and Female, age 16+ who are at risk of remand to custody and have no presenting needs</p> |
| <p>Programme Title and Provider</p> | <p>Electronic Monitoring of Bail (EM Bail)</p> |
| <p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p> | <p>On 17th May 2022, Electronic monitoring of bail was introduced at Kilmarnock Sheriff Court.</p> <p>Electronic monitoring can provide assurance about the restriction of movement of a monitored person by imposing time and locational limitations on the monitored person.</p> <p>The monitored person can, for example be monitored to help check that they remain in a specified place for a specified period (or be excluded from a specified place, at a specified time).</p> <p>As previously noted, a person's compliance with the terms of any condition is monitored by way of the person wearing a PID (commonly known as a "tag") and the installation of a home monitoring unit.</p> |
| <p>Possible Outcomes</p> | <p>Reduce remand to custody</p> |

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| Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention | <p>When an individual appears from custody, either as a new case or a warrant, prosecutors will consider whether they will oppose an accused's application for bail.</p> <p>Where time permits and as appropriate, JSW will provide an assessment to the court about the suitability of electronic monitoring as part of bail, to enable the court to make a decision on bail.</p> <p>In determining an application for bail, the court can determine whether monitoring any bail condition electronically would provide them with additional assurance as to the appropriateness of bail and the management of any risk of an individual being on bail.</p> |
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COMMUNITY PAYBACK ORDER: UNPAID WORK

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| Interventions suitable for | Available to all services users. |
| Programme Title and Provider | Unpaid work |
| Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available | <p>Unpaid work is suitable for all service users deemed fit to work. It serves as reparation in paying back to the community, aids rehabilitation, reintegration and challenges recidivism.</p> <p>A variety of work is undertaken while supervised within the local community, lighter duties are available for those with additional needs or disabilities.</p> <p>Personal placements may be offered to suitable low risk service users who would benefit from charity type placement opportunities which may lead them to volunteering or employment at a later time.</p> <p>Other activities are also available for a maximum of 30 hours which can be used towards total hours of unpaid work. Employability mentors are available to support service users into training, volunteering and employment (other activity).</p> |
| Possible Outcomes | Gives service users the opportunity to learn new skills, aid employability and reduce criminality. Provides structure and support to service users while serving the local community by undertaking work such as landscaping, litter picking, food bank support. |
| Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention | Assessed at CJSWR interview by social worker. Level 1 orders can be given without assessment for up to 100 hours. A further risk assessment and suitability assessment is then undertaken by Unpaid Work officer prior to Order commencing. |

| Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available | <p>On 17 May 2022 the Management of Offenders (Scotland) Act 2019 introduced use of Electronic Monitoring as a requirement of a CPO. In accordance with National Outcomes and Standards. Action Plans are developed using the appropriate risk assessment tools and plans to reduce the risk of reoffending.</p> <p>Electronic monitoring can provide assurance about the restriction of movement of a monitored person by imposing time and locational limitations on the monitored person.</p> <p>The monitored person can, for example be monitored to help check that they remain in a specified place for a specified period (or be excluded from a specified place, at a specified time).</p> <p>As previously noted, a person’s compliance with the terms of any condition is monitored by way of the person wearing a PID (commonly known as a “tag”) and the installation of a home monitoring unit.</p> |
| Possible Outcomes | Reduction in risk of reoffending, improved opportunities for service user, linked into other appropriate services |

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| Interventions suitable for | Men convicted of domestic abuse related offences |
| Programme Title and Provider | Caledonian System, Partnership Delivery Team |
| Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available | <p>The Caledonian System is an integrated approach to address men's domestic abuse and to improve the lives of women, children and men.</p> <p>It does this by working with men convicted of domestic abuse related offences on a programme to reduce their re-offending while offering integrated services to women and children.</p> <p>The Caledonian model takes the form of an intervention system comprising: the men's programme, women's service and children's service.</p> <p>The men's programme uses a person-centred approach coupled with cognitive behavioural techniques in order to encourage men to recognise their abuse and take responsibility for themselves and their relationship with the ex/partners and children.</p> <p>It is aimed at adult men, defined as over 16 years, whose abuse has been to a female partner or ex-partner.</p> <p>Men can be referred by the Court to this two-year programme if they have been convicted of offences involving domestic abuse. The programme is statutory, and men are required to attend.</p> |
| Possible Outcomes | Reduction in offending behaviour/risks associated with domestic abuse/violence, increased awareness of the causal factors underpinning offending behaviour. Increased safety for current/ex partners and children of men linked to programme. |
| Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention | CJSWR interview; Spousal Assault Risk Assessment / Caledonian Programme suitability assessment then Caledonian Programme Requirement imposed |
| Where no specific scheme / intervention is available, is there capacity to provide a bespoke service based on Judicial request? | Not with current resources without more information |

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| Interventions suitable for | Adult males convicted of sexual offences or offences with a sexual element |
| Programme Title and Provider | Moving Forward: Making Changes, Partnership Delivery Team |

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| <p>Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available</p> | <p>MFMC - The Moving Forward: Making Changes Programme has been designed by the Scottish Prison Service and The Community Justice Operational Practice Unit of the Scottish Government, in order to deliver best practice in Sex Offender treatment in Scotland. The programme is based on recent advances in research and practice, and from experiential learning gained from delivering programmes throughout the prison and criminal justice social work environments.</p> <p>It is based upon the dynamic risk factors identified through the Stable 2007 risk assessment and matches levels of intervention to levels of risk and need and assists participants to lead a satisfying life that does not involve harming others.</p> <p>Moving Forward: Making Changes is targeted at men aged 18 upward and it is anticipated that a period of up to 3 years will be required to fully complete the programme.</p> <p>The individual will complete a schedule of individual pre-group work with their case manager, followed by a period of assignment-based groupwork with other individuals, delivered by accredited facilitators. This is then followed by a further period of supplementary/maintenance work with the case manager.</p> |
| <p>Possible Outcomes</p> | <p>Reduction or absence of further sexual offending behaviour</p> |
| <p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p> | <p>CJSWR interview; LSCMi, Stable 2007 assessment, Risk Matrix 2000 assessment and subsequent imposition of MFMC Programme Requirement</p> |
| <p>Where no specific scheme / intervention is available, is there capacity to provide a bespoke service based on Judicial request?</p> | <p>Not with current resources without more information</p> |

| Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available | This would be assessed by Addiction Services or the appropriate service provider. The appropriate agency should be consulted and agree to deliver this requirement prior to it being suggested within CJSWR |
| Possible Outcomes | Reduction in alcohol use, abstinence, access to treatment programme |
| Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention | CJSWR interview; LSCMi, Audit and ABI Delivery |

DRUG TREATMENT AND TESTING

ORDER (DTTO)

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| Interventions suitable for | Individuals who have direct correlation between drug dependency and offending behaviour. |
| Programme Title and Provider | Drug Treatment and Testing Order (DTTO) |
| Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available | <p>Statutory Order for individuals who have direct correlation between drug dependency and offending behaviour.</p> <p>DTTO in Ayrshire have a specialised team consisting of Supervising Officers and Addiction Workers who work in partnership with NHS Addiction Services to provide treatment (both pharmacological and psychosocial) to facilitate change in behaviour and lifestyle.</p> <p>A recovery focused; person-centred approach is adopted to meet individual need. DTTO can be imposed for a duration of six months to three years depending upon presenting need at DTTO assessment stage.</p> <p>DTTO is considered to be direct alternative to custody and is considered for individuals who have exhausted every other Court disposal.</p> |

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| <p>Possible Outcomes</p> | <p>To break the cycle of drug dependency and offending behaviour through providing a person centred approach to treatment.</p> <p>Outcomes are measured subjectively by the Service User on a three-monthly basis utilising 9 areas of recovery; including relationships, self-care and nutrition; physical and mental health, drug use and offending behaviour.</p> <p>It is hoped that through the duration of the DTTO that scores within these axes will increase, with any decreases highlighting areas of support/addiction need.</p> |
| <p>Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention</p> | <p>At the CJSWR report writing stage a screening is undertaken to establish whether or not the individual meets the criteria.</p> <p>If the criteria is met, then a request is made to the Court to defer sentence for a period of four weeks to allow DTTO staff to undertake a full assessment of suitability.</p> <p>The DTTO assessment is undertaken by the Supervising Officer to establish whether the individual is a 'suitable' person with motivation to change their lifestyle.</p> <p>Gaps in offending behaviour are explored and areas of recovery capital and resilience identified to determine a starting point for treatment/interventions.</p> <p>DTTOs are reviewed by the Sentencer initially on a monthly basis and this process is undertaken within a closed Court to allow for direct dialogue between the sentencer and the service user.</p> <p>Interventions utilised by the team vary depending upon need. In the early stages a full care plan will be developed in collaboration with the service user and appropriate interventions will be employed to ensure that all areas of need are met.</p> <p>Motivational Interviewing is utilised in the early stages of a DTTO to encourage ambivalent individuals to consider areas of change.</p> |

STRUCTURED DEFERRED SENTENCE

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| <p>Interventions suitable for</p> | <p>Individuals who have a low to medium risk/needs rating (LSCMi) with regards to reoffending</p> |
| <p>Programme Title and Provider</p> | <p>Structured deferred sentence</p> |

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| Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available | <p>SDS is targeted at individuals who have a low to medium risk/needs rating (LSCMi) with regards to reoffending.</p> <p>This disposal targets individuals who have an identifiable need which could be explored and addressed through a six-month intervention. All types of low-level offending behaviour will be considered.</p> |
| Possible Outcomes | <p>A reduction in the risk of reoffending behaviour. When an SDS is imposed staff measure 5 areas of change which is revisited when the disposal nears its end.</p> <p>This is a subjective tool which measures areas of offending behaviour, substance misuse, connections, health and lifestyle.</p> |
| Process for Assessment and/or inclusion in scheme/intervention | <p>At the CJSWR report writing stage a screening is undertaken to establish whether or not the individual meets the criteria. If the criteria is met, then an action plan is established at this time and outlined within this section of the report.</p> <p>If the intervention is imposed a report will be submitted to Court after three months and a completion report after six months. Interventions are identified and delivered by staff on a bespoke basis as identified need at the screening stage can change considerably following the formation of a positive relationship with named worker.</p> |

| Details of all Specific national or local scheme/intervention(s) available | <p>Court Screening Service - Court Action Notes, Initial Assessment, Risk Alerts, Assessment for Bail Supervision, Advice, Sign Posting, Multiagency Updates, Liaison with Social Work Area Teams, FMHS, Lawyers, Sheriff Clerk, PF, Sheriffs and Prison Service.</p> <p>If the Court process ended many of these women could slip through the net and their needs may not be met. In the case of women who have never been arrested before, the worker is able to interview the woman in the custody cells and explain the procedure to them and be able to support them during the day if required.</p> <p>Their families are contacted, and information provided where necessary.</p> |
| Possible Outcomes | <p>Woman appeared at Custody Court, she was a resident in East Ayrshire but had never been involved in the justice system but was involved with Housing and Mental Health Services.</p> <p>The worker was able to contact these services and an update on the level of engagement/issues were gleaned. A proposed community-based management plan was formed to be put to the Sheriff via the Court Action Note. Bail with Special Conditions was then granted.</p> |
